An oracle/poem looking forward to the people returning to Jerusalem from Exile but also from further afield, a time of great joy and well being.

Questions for discussion: -

1. What are the key aspects of this homecoming listed here?
2. What are the aspects of a perfect society that we would look for today?

### ***Questions for personal reflection: -***

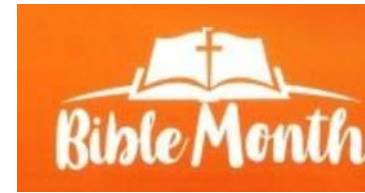
Our readings tell how God wants a society that is inclusive and welcoming.
